
November's Competition Theme is Fall Colours

PSSCC members were delighted when one of its original members, Don Lopp, shared his latest DIY 3D creation: a medium format viewer. Kludged together with duct tape and a twenty-year old light panel, the rough exterior belied the exquisite optics that are Don's passion. Built in one evening several weeks ago, the viewer features 45mm lenses that make medium format slides even more impressive. The immersive experience enjoyed by the members in attendance was the talk of last month's meeting.

Don has become positively dismissive of 35mm film, stating that, "35mm is nothing. I only look at medium format. This is an imitation of the Leep Viewer that was first built in the mid-80s, except the Leep isn't sharp." And we all know how fanatic Don is about sharpness.

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
H.L. Mencken once reminded his readers that "No one ever went broke underestimating the taste of the American public." The current 3D release of the 3 Musketeers is a far cry from Richard Lester's comedic treatment in 1973 that featured Michael York as d'Artagnan, Oliver Reed as Athos and Richard Chamberlain as Aramis. The conventional wisdom holds that movies are made for 13-year old boys, which in this case maligns 13-year old boys. And yet, the current production, which features an over-the-top score and hopelessly weak performances by all, seemed somehow a perfect fit for the venue in which we viewed the film.



We were invited to a special showing of the 3 Musketeers on opening weekend. The movie was easily upstaged by the theater, Cinetopia, one of two lavish complexes in the Portland area (if you consider Vancouver the Portland area). In addition to boasting "the largest screen from Canada to Los Angeles," ultra-wide leather seats with extra leg room, fireplaces throughout, premium concessions and gourmet popcorn, and Meyer Sound – whatever that is, within the massive complex one can visit Vinotopia, a restaurant and wine bar with indoor and outdoor seating where wines from around the world can be sampled on the deck that overlooks a pond of some sort that had docks but no boats.

And here's a twist: an art gallery spans the entire 21-and-over side of the theatre where alcohol is served. Prices for the pieces exhibited start at a modest \$1,200 and escalate to \$15,000 for Batman's image. Whaaat? Check out Superman to the left, created by Aimee Dieterle and Matthew Clarke.

There are flat screens simply everywhere, and the "Event Coordinator" can arrange anything from first-run movies to Blu-ray, Xbox 360, and Play-



What a shame to have to say that, since the film's director, Paul W. S. Anderson, is a passionate advocate for shooting 3D movies in actual 3D, rather than fudging it in post-production. At Comic Con last year, Anderson proclaimed that he would never make another movie without 3D.

We do have to hand it to Anderson for doing a yeoman's job of bringing the period costumes, elaborate da Vinci-esque airships and gorgeous landscapes to the screen. But all the leather seating, artwork, and gourmet popcorn in the world couldn't make up for our disappointment with this film.
